Nifty Tool Tip

How many times have you gone to hook up a trailer plug only to discover that, due to dirt or corrosion, some or even all of the lights are not functioning? A handy, easily stored solution to restoring a good electrical connection is a tire valve reamer tool. The pointed end works great for clearing dirt, while the other end of the tool fits snugly in the hole, and the threads help ream it out. In most cases your lights (assuming the problem is in the plug connection) will have good contact, and you'll be on the road. This nifty little tool takes up virtually no room, so do yourself a favor and toss one in the glove compartment of your tow vehicle.

Musings of an Outboard Enthusiast During a Pandemic

Time once again to tap on the keyboard to fill up the blank space. With the present situation, there is no lack of time, but obviously, no inspiration to be found at a club swap meet. I have a project waiting for me, but again, it is out of reach in a trusted friend's garage on the other side of the state. Closer to hand are a couple of 1940 Mercury K2 singles, so I have been looking into restarting long-dormant projects. Like many of my low end acquisitions, they have difficult issues. In this case, I have carburetors with a couple of pieces missing or mangled.

Tillotson MS series carburetors were a sort of one size fits all carburetor used on a wide range of engines from the early 1920's to early 1950's. Tillotson has a web site with some information relating to MS series, including an application list with a repair kit part number for some. Unfortunately, parts and kits are not offered. My understanding is that Tillotson went off-shore some time ago. Even so, I found the Tillotson site very interesting. There is a part of me that thrills at taking on new and near hopeless mechanical puzzles and another part of me that cringes at the thought of the actual work involved in solving them.



Curiously, the MS 113A was used by Kiekhaefer on Mercury K2 single and K4 and K5 twins (also some clone Wizard models). The K4 and K5 twins used a Rube Goldberg arrangement involving an additional adjustment needle to feed additional fuel into the manifold. Although a workable system, it asked a lot of the operator. Carburetors used with twins had an additional outlet in the bottom of the float bowl, with fittings and fuel line to feed the extra fuel. Mercury also used MS 115A on the 1940 Mercury K3 single.

Trying to piece together a pile of junk with missing and damaged parts is a far different part of the hobby than finding the rare original-condition running motor. I would not know what to do with a perfect example. No fun for me in that. At a swap meet you will find me digging down to the bottom of the bucket of greasy, dirty parts or sorting thru a bin of old props or looking under the tailgate for items not worth prime retail space. My logic is, if you know what you are looking for, look everywhere, it has to be somewhere. It also pays to have an open mind, as things you like will show up when you are looking for something entirely different.

When we again have club shows and swap meets I suspect they will be different from past events. Will we shake hands, have small groups in discussion (outboard related, of course) at indoor gatherings? Maybe not right away, maybe a bit later. I guess we will have to adapt to a new normal.


